# Q2: language

State a <u>point</u> about how language is used using terminology

Use a substantial piece of evidence

Explain and analyse the <u>effects</u> created by the writer's methods

## Q3: structure

Use <u>key words</u> in the question's bullet points to structure your answer

Use <u>evidence</u> or your own words; write a phrase

Analyse how each section is designed to engaged a reader. How does the next section add to this?

Use <u>interesting vocabulary</u>, including more complex devices

M

Metaphors, similes and personification will bring your story to life.

A

Adjectives and adverbs add detail and atmosphere to your work

G

Describe scenes <u>in general and in</u> <u>detail</u>

E

Include characters' emotions



S

Involve the <u>5</u> senses; show, don't tell







## Q1: true or false?

Use key words in the question to focus your response on both extracts

<u>Identify</u> and <u>interpret</u> <u>implicit</u> and explicit meanings. Infer reasons why these might exist

What do these ideas <u>suggest</u> about the author's views?

Synthesise similarities and differences between texts

Infer: why do they think this way, what are they concerned about?


Include <u>evidence</u>; which method is used to demonstrate the view?
